



Damage per 1,000 (Inbound)










Oregon Damage Heat Map (DPT)

Ratio shows counties with a higher propensity for damage



DIRT Data Considerations and Limitations

- In 2023, one large operator went from 350+ to 50+; another reported 250+ nationally but does not allow Oregon to view their reporting.
- Not all facility operators/owners submit excavation damage information. Oregon does not require excavation damage reporting. How can we increase participation?
- Some flawed, conflicting, duplicate entries; near misses
- Consideration for reporting bias
- "Other" and "unknown/other" categories

Higher or lower damage rates also reflect the respective level of consistent and reliable reporting.





Primary Objectives

- 1. GUIDING DIRECTION: With all of the data available to us, how can we make better informed decisions about where to focus our efforts and allocate our resources?
- 2. PROVING EFFECTIVENESS: How can we use data to measure our effectiveness and prove our results?

Moving the needle and measuring results




- Outreach and education have a voice; improvement not punitive
- Strengthen strategic partnerships, sharing of information
 - CGA, Utilities, OUCC/UCC, agencies, contractors, locators, trade organizations
- Integrate takeaways in Training and Education classes and videos





How to use the Oregon 811 app.



- Excavators, homeowners, and facility operators can use the Oregon Utility Notification Center app to easily and quickly manage locate requests. Anyone planning to excavate in Oregon can use the app to initiate, manage and monitor a locate request prior to excavation. Facility operators can use the ticket management feature to provide a positive response to excavators.
- Submit and manage tickets
 - Look up area locates to duplicate tickets if it matches scope of work.
 - Drop GPS waypoints at your current location
 - Excavators can Upload pictures to specific locate tickets
 - Keep track of ongoing or new tickets (Expiration Dates and Notes on Completion)
- Utility Operators can Respond to ticket requests.
 - Locators can view tickets to see the polygon and scope of work.






Overall BEAD Status and Timeline

Post-Curing BDP Applicant Locations




BEAD Eligible Locations (OR Challenge Map Update 6-24-24)


